
Look at the intervals between the lotes in this triad. Use the keyboard and the tone ladder to help.


D to F is a minor 3^{r-1} (the are to be semitones between D and F) and F to A is a Major and (there are four semitones between F and A).

It is this pattern or arvals that make this triad sound different to the Major triad.

or riad: the bottom 3rd is a minor 3rd and the top 3rd is a Major 3rd.





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There are three minor triads built on notes in a Major scale: chords ii, iii and vi. (Note the use of lower case Roman Numerals for minor triads).



Triads ii, iii and vi are all **minor** triads. Singing the following exercise will practise these triads melodically, then harmonically, in C Major.
